Letter from the Chair

Dear Everyone,

There have been a few changes on the committee recently. Sadly Jenny Gilbert has had to step down mid-term for personal reasons. I would like to thank Jenny for her very welcome contribution and wish her well for the future. Sue Holland has taken over the role of Membership Secretary from Jenny and Michele Gordon has taken over the role of Minutes Secretary from Sue.

The CT Leads networking day at Hospice House in May was well attended and well evaluated. There was a lot of discussion about the Complementary Therapy (Safeguarding Practice) Measures. The main areas of concern were around lack of consultation, the requirement of some networks that therapists be registered with the Complementary and Natural Healthcare Council (CNHC) or other regulator and obtaining the patient's written consent to treatment. As a result of this discussion and the recent membership survey regarding the Measures, a small group of CT unit leads composed a letter to the National Cancer Action Team detailing the concerns and we are currently awaiting a reply.

The CT Leads networking day also discussed evaluating practice and in particular the MyCaW tool. There was some enthusiasm

for a further meeting concentrating on outcome measures and evaluating practice, the committee will discuss this at the next meeting in August.

George Bell, Head of Education at Help the Hospices, gave an inspiring talk about the value and necessity of training a work force "fit for purpose" and introduced the subject of Help the Hospices own educational hub about to go live in pilot form. In the meantime he recommended the Current Learning in Palliative Care (CLIP) materials for private study and CPD points which are available to do online in 15 minute chunks on the Help the Hospices website: www.helpthehospices.org.uk/clip/index.htm Give them a go and let us know what you think.

Not long now until our annual conference in September. It is already quite well subscribed with lots of people coming the afternoon before for the networking meeting and to enjoy socializing over dinner. I do hope that you will be able to join us. Enjoy your summer.

CT Leads Group

Coordinator Meeting - 20th May 2011

The CT Leads meeting was held at Hospice House and had a very good turnout of twenty five members from all areas of the UK. The day was centered around Complementary Therapy Measures (Safeguarding Practice) published by the National Cancer Action Team.

Chris West (NACTHPC chair) gave a very informative talk on the issues affecting therapists working in palliative care settings. The subject generated a great deal of discussion amongst the attendees and it was put forward that a working party would look at writing a statement on behalf of NACTHPC and its members regarding regulation and other issues such as consent.

The meeting also included a discussion on minimum data sets. Chris shared some feedback from the renewal survey, which highlights the different methods services are using to collect data regarding complementary therapies. There was an opportunity for members to share their experiences and a number of therapists are using MYCAW as a data collection tool, with others using differing methods. Sharing ideas around evaluation was invaluable considering how members can use such tools to conduct larger pieces of complementary therapy research.

The day was completed by a very lively talk from George Bell, who is head of education for Help the Hospices. He expanded on some of the issues that had been raised regarding Complementary Therapy Measures. He also discussed how Help the Hospices are developing their training and education and how NACHTPC members will be able to benefit from this service.

Afterwards we had a chance to meet the performing arts students and talk with them and their tutor – I think they had as many questions for us and what we do as we had for them – so a good interchange was had by all.

Thus we came to the end of a wonderful study day amongst the students and tutors of Canterbury College. Thank you all and in particular Katrina and Ruthanne who put the study day together.

Study Day - 11th April - Heart of Kent Hospice

Another really interesting day was enjoyed by eighteen members, including some new faces, who attended the South East Region Group meeting on 11.04.11, held at the Heart of Kent Hospice.

Martyn Yates welcomed all the newcomers to SERG and the National Association and briefly talked about the role they play in our everyday life. He then gave an update on the current NACTHPC news and spoke about the co-ordinators Q & A forum, where members can put questions or disperse information. The benefit of a 'Sensory Room' within a Hospice setting was discussed as well as several other local matters.

Maureen Lyons - Occupational Therapist and Lynn Clinton - Physiotherapist, gave a very enlightening talk on their roles within the Hospice, how their work links in with the Complementary Therapy Team and how all types of treatment can work together for the benefit of patients and carers alike. We were given an insight of their work from referral to discharge, or other pathways, not solely hands on, but in their advisory capacity and encouragement for people to accept change. They work with patients and families through a whole range of situations including pain management, mobility, breathlessness, coping with fatigue, sleep therapy and finding suitable care packages in the community where appropriate, to name but a few! We heard how they work closely together and often make joint home visits to maximise the quality of life for patients and family on a physical, psychological and emotional level. We were introduced to a whole range of equipment and their (sometimes) creative uses. We were also given a number of very useful handouts.

Maggie Maule followed this with a really fascinating talk and slides of her experiences from her trip to India teaching reflexology organised through the Reflexology Outreach International Team. Their first stop was in Kolcatta (Calcutta) which was quite challenging as their students were actually either HIV or AIDS patients who had come to collect their regular medication. None of the students spoke any English and many couldn't read. However, they managed to find an excellent interpreter. Maggie talked about the cultural differences, especially in respect of men and women working together and on each other.

We saw some interesting slides of the 'accommodation' and heard how breakfast every morning was curry, rice and chapattis! The next stop was Bodghaya, a 10 hour train journey north. Here the students were nuns and midwifes, all spoke fluent English and were all conversant with A & P, making life much easier with the teaching.

Maggie said that teaching reflexology in India was the most amazing and challenging experience I have had, and she left us with this ancient Indian saying:

"Disease does not go near one who massaged his feet before sleeping, Just as snakes do not approach eagles."

We were treated to another superb lunch (we regulars expect nothing less from The Heart of Kent Hospice catering staff, and they never disappoint, thank you).

After lunch Annie Baker talked to us about her very challenging remit of developing a "Drop In" for carers and the bereaved. What a huge task!

Anne spoke about how she involves complementary therapies, relaxation, some beauty sessions, CAB talks, Yoga, information focussed agencies, shows, outings and has even put on pantos – phew! All this has been achieved despite major building work happening at the Hospice. Anne has a good band of volunteers, each with their own 'speciality' who helps her in this constant learning curve.

We rounded off the day with LEBED – Healthy Steps, led by Sarah Bishop. When did you last see 18 'grown ups' blowing bubbles, doing Hawaiian dancing and donning cowboy hats, (mostly pink), to step out to "Keep Your Hat on"? What fun!

Complementary Therapy Staff Open Day

In January of this year the complementary therapy team at the Prince of Wales Hospice held an open day for staff. The purpose of the day was to educate staff about the new complementary service, how to refer to the service and what is available. The day included exhibits, taster treatments, and a presentation and relaxation group.

Although complementary therapies have been available for a number of years, from October 2010 the service evolved to a small team of 3, providing therapies to patients and carers of incare, day therapy and an appointment service which includes staff.

The Hospice is about to start building work to create a new day therapy, therapy suite and educational facility. The building work should be completed by September this year and then the open day will be repeated for Health Care Professionals who refer into the service from community.

The therapy suite will provide the team with 2 more treatment rooms and a small reception area where patients and carers can be welcomed into the suite. We are very excited to move into the new suite, we hope to give patients and carers a little bit of well deserved luxury!

A Success Story at Overgate Hospice

(I recently met Christine and Vedant at our Regional Yorkshire Group meeting. Our visitors had travelled from London, and this felt very positive. After listening to and sharing our individual concerns, opinions and experiences, I was asked to contribute a piece for "The Link" magazine.)

This last month has been a period of reflection for me. Since October 2010 my service has been delivered from makeshift arrangements, due to ongoing building work creating an extended Day Care Centre here at Overgate. I have been based in this area of the Hospice for the past eleven years, sharing space that often had to be vacated at a moments notice resulting in frustration and disappointing situations for my patients. We moved into the new build at the beginning of June – a suite of three treatment rooms, my own office and a computer and telephone! My team of

wonderful Volunteers are as thrilled as I am that we now have the opportunity to provide treatments in lovely rooms that are appropriate to giving our guests the very best that we can.

Our local paper produced a '30 Years of Overgate Hospice' supplement and my own story was featured, starting as a volunteer in 1981; mop and bucket at the ready, meals to serve and flowers to arrange. Working as a volunteer for nine years convinced me that I wanted to be part of this 'special place' and 1994 saw me start work as a Nursing Auxiliary. As a qualified Massage Practitioner, I could see how much patients would benefit from 'caring touch'. Slowly the medical team recognised that the soothing treatments were very much appreciated and valued by those patients receiving them – adding an extra dimension to their care. A new Day Care Centre opened and I was offered hours to provide 'therapies' to patients – a one woman service!

In 2000 I gave up my nursing duties to concentrate on developing the Complementary Therapy service; starting with 12 hours over 4 days. Acknowledgement of the positive effects given by the therapies slowly grew, and a recent increase now gives me 31.5 hours. Now 80% of referrals to Day Care request complementary therapy input! We now have one paid therapist working over two days, and I have built a team of very supportive volunteers enabling delivery of the service at Overgate Hospice. The vision that I have held for so long is now becoming a reality; and my hope of integrating complementary therapies into a holistic care programme is part of an ongoing process of growth and development for all of my team at Overgate.

5th Children's Complementary Therapy Network

Conference

Complementary Therapies and ADHD

Management of Attention Deficit Hyperactive Disorder (ADHD) was the key theme for the 5th CCTN conference held on the 7th May 2011 at the Birmingham Children's Hospital. Similar to previous years the conference gathered participants from all over the UK and internationally, representing complementary therapy, medical and allied health sectors. Of particular importance was the opportunity to share international experiences through discussions and interactive complementary therapy workshops to create a learning network and to promote the use of complementary therapies.

The opening presentations commenced with a comprehensive overview of ADHD by Dr Basia Bielinski (Consultant Paediatrician). ADHD is a common neurobehavioral disorder affecting 3-9% of children in the UK. Dr Bielinski discussed the theories about the causes of ADHD, followed by the conventional approach to its assessment, diagnosis and management. She also identified that children with ADHD may continue to have problems in adulthood.

Dr TV Sairam gave a fascinating account of Proto-Raga Therapy, a type of music therapy based on Indian 'rags' (notes), and how it has benefited disabled children he has been working with in India. The conference delegates had the unique opportunity to experience some of the personal impacts of this approach when Dr Sairam guided them through the chanting of some of the sounds that are used.

Margaret Gambardella presented the Magical Parenting Programme which she has developed for families of children with challenging behaviour, including ADHD. She gave some valuable tips from the programme that delegates could utilise with families they are working with. She also identified the importance of supporting the parents and the siblings as well as the affected child.

Dr Indu Ravindranath gave a welcome overview of Ayurveda, including the underlying principles and philosophies of this ancient system. She crystallised this information by demonstrating how it relates to the ayurvedic assessment and treatment of someone with ADHD.

In the afternoon delegates were able to participate in interactive workshops designed to teach them about specific therapeutic approaches and to learn some new skills to take away with them. There were four workshops to choose from:

- Anita Epple ran a workshop on Baby Massage, highlighting the importance of this approach in helping to enhance all forms of communication (e.g. touch, sound, smell and visual) between the parent and child.
- Lorraine Murray described the openness of children to meditation and how practitioners can teach children to use meditation (e.g. to aid relaxation and grounding).
- Margaret Gambardella gave a fascinating presentation on primitive reflexes, how they emerge and integrate, the impact on the child's learning, behaviour and emotional development of their non-integration / reactivation,

and how to aid their integration through a movement programme.

 Morag Heirs, Annie Hall and Philippa Fibert put forward three different perspectives of homeopathy and ongoing research work that each of them were doing to study the use of homeopathy in children with ADHD. Morag reiterated the challenges of designing trials suitable for complementary therapies.

During the breaks, delegates also had the opportunity to view various poster presentations and exhibitor stalls covering a variety of topics, including:

- Family workshops to teach families simple complementary therapy skills.
- The Listening Training Program for improving auditory skills and communication.
- Sensory therapy for children with limited mobility (combining music and aromatherapy).
- The use of NES Health Infoceuticals for behaviour and learning issues in autism.
- Information on Reiki from the UK Reiki Federation.

Reiki taster sessions were also available during the day from members of the UK Reiki Federation.

The conference was a great opportunity not just for learning but also for networking with like minded people.



We always look and care for the person whom we love the most.


But we fail to look back at those who love us the most.
