# 2009 - 2010

#### Membership

The membership data in this review describe the membership at the end of July 10. At this time there were 99 unit members and 50 individual members.

## Agenda for Change (AfC)


28 out of 99 units have evaluated complementary therapy jobs according to Agenda for Change. There is a wide variance in the grading for jobs with the same title. There can be considerable differences in the requirements of the job but we don't currently have the data, regarding the various job profiles, for comparison.

Service Leads

76 units gave notice of the numbers of hours worked by a dedicated CT service lead. Number of hours worked varied between 3 and 56 hours per week.




#### Number of hours per week

#### Therapies practised

There is a very wide range of therapies practised. The most commonly used therapies can be seen in the charts below. A list of the other therapies practiced is attached to this report.





The membership registration form this year asked for the number of interventions for each therapy given in 2009. 26 units supplied this data. These units were hospices (19), cancer support centres (3), children's hospice (1) and a hospital (1). The total number of interventions given for these 26 units was an impressive 36,729. The range was 10 - 10,160 which reflects the diversity of the activity within our unit members. The average number of interventions was 1530 and the median was 677.

#### Research

Areas of research that members are involved with are: Acupuncture and fatigue – randomised, controlled trial Acuband trial Aromastix project and audits Aromatherapy and fungating wound project Acuseeds/pressure pilot study MyCaw with healthcare professionals Evaluation of monitoring service Ear acupuncture Investigating Reiki research Acupuncture and lymphoedema Wellbeing in cancer survivors Essential oils in wound care Relaxation in outpatient clinic MyCaW evaluation of Yoga and Lebed class Evaluation of use of gentle touch Complementary therapy questionnaire

We have no further details of the content of the above audits and research but it is interesting to get an idea of what members are involved in. Hopefully we will see some of the results published in journals the near future.

### Conference 2009

The 2009 NACTHPC 9<sup>th</sup> annual conference and AGM was held on 17<sup>th</sup> September at the University of Warwick, Coventry entitled "Sharing the Journey" *Expertise, Evidence and Communication (Knowing what we do, showing what we do, sharing what we do)* 

There were 82 delegates and a 91% return on the evaluation. The evaluation was, on the whole, very positive with particular praise given to the speakers and for the "range and very high standard of the presentations".

#### Conference 2010

The 10<sup>th</sup> annual conference and AGM will be held, once again, at the University of Warwick. The title is Feeding the Body, Feeding the Soul. We have some very interesting speakers covering different aspects of self-nourishment – feeding the body and feeding the soul - from dietary advice to walking the Labyrinth. There will be information about the new e-learning courses from the Freshwinds Institute of Integrated Medicine and a demonstration of the Complementary and Alternative Medicine Library Information Service (CAMLIS) as well as posters and an information table.



Objectives for 2009 - 10

• Publish a 2 year plan

An outline of a plan was published in Issue 24 of The Link at the beginning of the year. It included the two objectives listed below and a further objective of the development of a minimum data set (MDS) regarding the practice of complementary therapies in palliative care.

- Start central training programme to be available to regional groups covering subjects such as communication, protecting your energy and managing stress.
   Access to such a programme has been offered to regional groups but so far there has been no enquiry regarding this
- Continue work on complementary therapy role profiles
  Members were invited (via The Link) to join working parties to progress the work on Role Profiling and the MDS, it was hoped that those working parties would detail the plan for each project. Working parties have not yet been formed due to lack of members volunteering to help with the work.
  Some preliminary work has been done, however, collecting sample job descriptions for a matching exercise for the role descriptions.
  The extra data collected on the renewal forms regarding number of therapeutic interventions will inform the work on the minimum data set.

Objective for 2010 –11

• To identify members who would be willing and able to progress the above projects
